

Work with the children to allocate characters and prepare a short performance. Discuss the stage directions in advance and make sure the children understand how to follow the script.

| Narrator 1:  | Mr. Hoppy lived alone. Only two things were important to him.  |
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| Narrator 2:  | The first thing was the flowers which grew on his balcony. The second thing was Mrs. Silver.   |
| Narrator 1:  | Mrs. Silver was a very nice woman who lived below<br>Mr. Hoppy's flat. They spoke every morning.   |
| Narrator 2:  | Like Mr. Hoppy, she lived alone.<br>Every day, Mr. Hoppy thought:  |
| Mr. Hoppy:   | I will invite her up for a cup of tea today.   |
| Narrator 1:  | But he was never brave enough.   |
| Narrator 2:  | There was another problem, too. Mrs. Silver had a small tortoise called Alfie, and she gave all her love to him.   |
| Narrator 1:  | One morning, Mr. Hoppy called:   |
| Mr. Hoppy:   | Good morning, Mrs. Silver. How is Alfie today?   |
| Mrs. Silver: | I'm worried about him, Mr. Hoppy. I weighed him when<br>he first came to me 11 years ago. He was 10 ounces<br>then, and he's only 13 ounces now. I want him to grow. |

| Narrator 2:  | Suddenly, Mr. Hoppy had an idea.   |
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| Mr. Hoppy:   | Mrs. Silver, I think that I can help. Wait there.<br>I need to write something for you.  |

| Narrator 1:  | Mr. Hoppy came back on to his balcony with a piece of paper. He lowered it down to Mrs. Silver.  |
| Mrs. Silver: | ( <i>Reading the note</i> ) ESIO TROT, ESIO TROT, WORG!<br>WORG! What DOES it mean?  |
| Mr. Hoppy:   | It's tortoise language. Tortoises can only understand<br>backwards words. It means:<br>TORTOISE, TORTOISE, GROW! GROW!<br>Say these words to Alfie three times a day, and<br>he will get bigger. |
| Mrs. Silver: | Mr. Hoppy, if this helps, you will be my best friend in the world!   |
| Narrator 2:  | Back in his flat, Mr. Hoppy thought of her words, and he did a little dance.   |

| Narrator 2:  | He bought more than a hundred tortoises. They were all bigger than Alfie.  |
| Narrator 1:  | Then, he made a clever tool. He called it a tortoise-catcher.  |
| Narrator 2:  | Mrs. Silver went out at about two o'clock.<br>Mr. Hoppy went out on to his balcony with the<br>tortoise-catcher.   |
| Narrator 1:  | He lowered his tool down on to Mrs. Silver's balcony, and he carefully pulled Alfie up.  |



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| Narrator 2:  | Mr. Hoppy looked for a tortoise that weighed 15<br>ounces. He found one that looked the same as<br>Alfie but was 2 ounces bigger. He lowered it<br>carefully on to Mrs. Silver's balcony. |
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| Narrator 1:  | Mrs. Silver came home, and she said to the tortoise,<br>"ESIO TROT, ESIO TROT, WORG! WORG!"   |
| Mr. Hoppy:   | How is Alfie tonight, Mrs. Silver?  |
| Mrs. Silver: | Oh, he is wonderful!  |
| Narrator 2:  | After that, Mr. Hoppy changed Mrs. Silver's tortoise every week.  |
| Narrator 1:  | The next week, he changed it for a tortoise that<br>weighed 17 ounces.<br>Then, one that weighed 19 ounces<br>21 ounces<br>23 ounces<br>25 ounces<br>and finally, a 27-ounce tortoise!    |
| Mrs. Silver: | Look, Mr. Hoppy! Alfie can't go into his house.<br>He's too big!  |
| Mr. Hoppy:   | Weigh him, Mrs. Silver.   |
| Mrs. Silver: | 27 ounces! Clever Mr. Hoppy!  |
