How does Read It Yourself compare to Key Words?

Both Read It Yourself and Key Words share the same purpose: to help children to learn to read the most common and therefore most useful words in the English language.

In order to be able to read fluently, need to be able to read these words at a glance.

As the two series are both carefully designed to embed the most useful words within an enjoyable and motivating reading experience, there is considerable overlap between the words that children will learn from each of them. Reading books from either series will help children to read books from the other. Each will also support children to become fluent readers who can go on to read any book they choose.

What types of books will children read across the series and how are they organised?

Similarities and differences

- Key Words follows the adventures of familiar characters through different stories, perfect for those children who like to return to the same world when they pick up a book, as well embedding words and ideas in a memorable context.
- Read It Yourself offers a wide range of subject matter, allowing children to find a book that matches their interests at every level, as well as introducing them to new types of books and topics.
 - Both series are carefully levelled to offer clear progression in grammar and sentence structure, as well as the words they introduce children to.



Which words will the two series introduce children to?

Read It Yourself	Key Words with Peter and Jane
High-frequency key words are repeated throughout each book across the series.	• Introduces children to 300 of the most important key words for learning how to read

Similarities and differences

- Both Key Words and Read it Yourself introduce children to the 200 most common words that they will need to read fluently.
 - The great majority of other high-frequency words are also included across both series.
 - Key Words focuses on 300 key words, and revisits them up to 10 times per book to develop fluency.
- Read It Yourself introduces story or subject words in each book in addition to the key words for each level, meaning children will encounter a broader range of words that are repeated less frequently.



How do the two series use phonics to help children to learn to read?

Similarities and differences

- Both series present an opportunity for children to develop their phonics.
- Key Words embeds the most useful key words within decodable texts, growing in difficulty as the levels progress to match the children's improving skills.





• Read It Yourself offers phonically decodable texts at Level 0, providing a foundation of phonics knowledge and practise before starting on the levelled texts.
